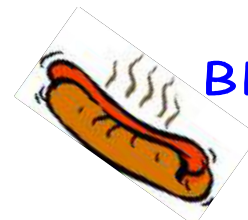
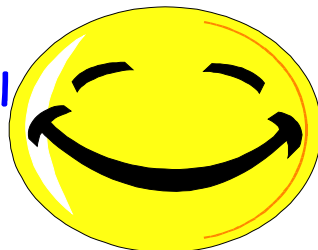

JULY TRIP TO "THE HAVEN"

It stood modestly in an untidy corner of a gravel strewn car park in West Swindon, a patch of Field Cow Wheat, one of the rarest wild flowers in the British Isles. It is found in only a handful of sites and we members of the WHGC were privileged to gaze upon its countenance! As a group we had joined Mr. John Ball a Wild Flower expert on a (literal) field trip to 4 of his

81 wild flower sites which he has created and managed over many years. Initially, we visited a private garden given over exclusively to wild flowers, and then we travelled to Lydiard Church. Here a regime of non-mowing of grass had allowed Bird's Foot Trefoil to establish interspersed with Self-Heal. The colour scheme was of swathes of purple and yellow. From there we went to "The Haven" at Cheyney Manor which has taken 15 years to develop. It was interesting to note how different horticultural practices had allowed flowers and trees to co-exist. A thriving bee colony complimented the site. Finally, we visited a park in Stratton complete with sculptures and different colonies of wild flowers. John's enthusiasm for and wide knowledge of wild flowers, plus his willingness to discuss and pass on information, made the afternoon especially enjoyable. We learned that "wild" did not mean untidy and ugly, but given the correct conditions and placing "the right plant in the right place" gave a gentle natural beauty to each site. The most important requirement, lowering soil fertility takes several years and gradually allows more and more plants to colonise an area until a balance is achieved. We went away armed with knowledge, seed and plants ready for our "walk on the wild side".

St Peter Ad Vincula Concert Series in aid of the Church Fund

The Garth Trio – 10th May 2014

Concert go-ers were treated to an outstanding performance from Welsh professionals Meinir Heulyn (Harp), Eva Stewart (Flute) and James Drummond (Viola). The Trio immediately established a rapport with the audience as each of the performers introduced the items in turn, speaking with passion and knowledge about the pieces chosen for their programme. In return they received the warmth and intent listening of their capacity audience.

Their opening work, a Trio Sonata in A minor by Telemann, showed off the instrumental skills of each player and also the quality of their work as ensemble players, with superb balance and contrast in sound. As with several of their items, this was their own realisation and arrangement of the piece. Then came the ever-popular trio arranged for harp, viola and flute –the Rondo in A by Mozart. This was performed with great style, with each performer taking advantage of the structure of the piece to compose their own solo 'cadenza' passage.

Before the interval The Garth Trio played the more rarely heard 'Zodiac Trio' by the Welsh composer William Matthias. This was written in 1976 for his friends, Spanish harpist Marisa Robles, flautist Christopher Hyde Smith and viola player Frederick Riddle, with each of the three movements reflecting the character and Zodiac sign of a friend. The audience clearly enjoyed this unusual piece.

The second half of the concert opened with Beethoven's 'Serenade' opus 25 – a series of short, light-hearted movements to divert guests of an evening. The final piece of the concert was more challenging for the audience – Debussy's Sonata for Flute, Viola and Harp. The Sonata's structure is as unusual as Debussy's choice of instruments for the era - 1915, when northern France was in the depths of the First World War. The mood is often subdued, the music fragmentary, reflecting Debussy's mood at the time. Challenging music – but poignant and beautiful in the hands of these highly experienced performers.

Our thanks to all who attended or helped to organise the event – and to those who prepared the excellent food and manned the bar. We were delighted to raise in excess of £1,600 for this concert and the concert in September with The Lacuna String Quartet and guest clarinetist Peter Fielding.

FABULOUS FLOWERS

How do you depict 'Hospitality through the Ages' as a floral arrangement? Now, there's a conundrum!

In early May, e-mails and notices were sent to all residents in Winterbourne Bassett informing them that a flower festival was to be held in the Church of St Katherine & St Peter over the weekend of 28th/29th June and exhibitors were needed! Initially, there was a flurry of activity as everybody communicated with each other, trying to pick brains about the theme. Then, all went very quiet, and the organising committee wondered if anyone would actually come forward as an exhibitor with a title to their arrangement!

The committee needn't have worried! Ultimately, twenty-four highly creative and beautiful floral presentations adorned the church over that last June weekend. The weather may not have been 'flaming' but the colours in the church more than made up for the clouds outside. Many visitors were amazed at so much talent in such a small community.

Then, having admired the displays, everybody made for the tea tent set up alongside the church. Here, hospitality included the first cup of tea but nobody could resist buying a slice of one of the delicious cakes on offer, and indeed, some people even bought whole cakes to take home! These cakes, all homemade, were donated by the quite wonderful collection of cake-makers we have in the village and they provided more than enough for the two days in a very busy tea tent!

After a refreshing cuppa, many visitors went to visit gardens in the village generously thrown open by their owners. Each was very different from the others and those who returned for a second cup of tea and cake said how inspirational the 'garden walks' had been.

Sunday dawned brighter so many more visited the festival. The tea tent was even busier so it was understandable that all the volunteers were looking forward to a quiet and peaceful church service that evening. But, it was not to be.

Our dear Maria had other ideas. She had created a very special service wrapped around the theme of flowers and hospitality. Thus there were appropriate hymns and readings but the high point was Maria's "dramatized sermon" about loaves and fishes and the feeding of the five thousand, a script she wrote which then, with the help of her friend Mathew, a professional actor, was performed with great skill and enthusiasm generating much laughter and appreciation. Members of the congregation were moved to give a rousing round of applause – and that's not often heard in church!

Finally, Clare and Martin Knight cracked open bottles of Prosecco and we all talked over the events of the last few days. £560 was raised towards maintaining the fabric of our church. This proved very timely for the foot of one of our number went through a floorboard while cleaning on the Monday! All floorboards will need replacing in the not too distant future – more expense – so any money donated has, and will be, gratefully received.....!

Opinion was that the festival had been a great success and that this was entirely due to the village residents and two supporting village friends from another Wiltshire village who deserve enormous gratitude for participating in so many ways. Without them all there would have been no flower festival.

On August 4th at 10pm we have an opportunity to unite with millions around the world to commemorate the outbreak of the First World War, and to make a pledge to live lives where peace and love and understanding are fostered in our community and in our world, that the sacrifices of those who died may not be in vain. We begin with an hour of readings, music and quiet as we recall what happened, then at 11pm we ring out the bells and begin an Act of Commemoration and Commitment to Peace.

'They shall beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks: nation shall not lift up sword against nation and neither shall they learn war any more' says Isaiah, the prophet.

But first, peace must begin with me.
